BRIEF DESCRIPTION:

At the end of 2023, approximately 39.9 million people globally are living with Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) (WHO, 2024), with the Asia Pacific region representing a quarter of all new HIV infections worldwide. Daily statistics reveal that in the Asia Pacific region 300 gay men and other men who have sex with men (MSM) contract HIV, along with 80 individuals who inject drugs, 50 sex workers, and 15 transgender people. Additionally, 17 individuals die from AIDS-related causes every hour, nine (9) of whom are young people in the Asia Pacific based on the interview with Eamonn Murphy, UNAIDS Regional Director for Asia and the Pacific region (Shukla, 2024).

Further, while the overall trends of HIV incidence and Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS)-related deaths are declining globally, an increase in new cases was reported to the

HIV/AIDS and ART Registry of the Philippines. From 2012 to 2023, there was a 411% increase in daily incidence (Gangcuangco & Eustaquio, 2023).

Based on UNAIDS (2024) data, there is an approximately 190,000 adults and children living with HIV in the Philippines with around 180,000 or 94.7% of these are men. Another data, showed that there is a total of 119,145 HIV infection cases recorded as of December 2023approximately 41 new cases per day. Most of these cases were male (112,122, 94.0%) and only 63.2 % or 75, 300 are on Antiretroviral therapy (ART) (Dela Vega, 2024). Based on the report, Region 1 ranked 8th on the number of diagnosis HIV cases by region of residence as of 2023. From January to April 2024, Pangasinan ranks highest in HIV Cases among the four provinces in the region.

There is also a rising trend of HIV cases among young people, particularly college students. WHO, the Global Fund, and UNAIDS have developed global strategies to combat HIV that align with the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) target 3.3, aiming to end the HIV epidemic by 2030. By 2025, it is expected that 95% of those living with HIV will be diagnosed, 95% of whom will be receiving life-saving antiretroviral treatment, and 95% of those on treatment will achieve a suppressed viral load, enhancing their health and reducing transmission. In 2023, the corresponding figures were 86%, 89%, and 93% (WHO, 2024).

In response to the growing concern about HIV infections, the Philippines enacted Republic Act 11166, which strengthens the comprehensive policy on HIV and AIDS prevention, treatment, care, and support, while also reconstituting the Philippines National AIDS Council (PNAC). Recently, Chairman Prospero de Vera issued a memorandum reiterating to the HEIs the "Integration of HIV/AIDS and Other Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) Education, Prevention, Treatment, and Health Promotion in Tertiary Education." It is recognized that HEIs have a responsibility to mitigate the concern about HIV/AIDS.

In response, CHEDROI recognizes the need to enhance collaboration with other agencies to inform Gender and Development focal points, deans, department chairs, and students about current policies and the status of HIV/AIDS. Therefore, a **2024 Higher Education Conference** (HEC) on Gender Issues is proposed. The 2024 HEC will be themed "Empowering Futures: Addressing HIV/AIDS Prevention and Education in Higher Education," featuring one on-site conference for all HEIs.

This one-day conference aims to:

- Raise awareness among future leaders and trainers of future leaders: Higher education institutions educate the future leaders and influencers of society. A conference focused on HIV/AIDS awareness equips students and faculty with critical knowledge to advocate for public health initiatives.
- Address the vulnerable population: Young adults, particularly in college settings, are at heightened risk for HIV. The conference can address their unique challenge and promote strategies for prevention and education.
- Foster collaboration: Bringing together diverse stakeholders students, faculty (GAD focal), deans and heads of health programs, DOH personnel encourages





collaboration and the sharing of resources to enhance HIV awareness and support services.

- **4. Combat stigma**: Conferences provide opportunities to challenge stigma surrounding HIV/AIDS through open discussions, personal stories, and educational sessions, fostering a more supportive environment on campuses.
- 5. Sustainability of Efforts: By encouraging an annual conference, institutions can ensure continuous focus in HIV/AIDS awareness, building a culture of education and advocacy that extends beyond the event.

Participants will include Gender and Development focal points from HEIs, student leaders, and deans or program chairs from medicine, health, and biology programs across the region.
